Thankful for veterinary clinics

In 2010 when Lincoln Animal Ambassadors (LAA) began discussing a low cost spay/ neuter program, several local veterinarians approached us to tell us they would like to be included in just such a program. That was a huge sign we needed to move forward.

Obviously, LAA would not be able to have a low cost spay/neuter program without our veterinarians. LAA is incredibly thankful for the veterinary clinics who have worked to make sure this program has seen continued success for the last six years. We want to thank the veterinary clinics in Lincoln who have spayed and neutered a staggering number of 2,400 dogs, cats and rabbits as part of our mission of addressing the root causes of animal homelessness in our area. These veterinarians and their staff have contributed an enormous amount of time, money and support to hundreds of animals and LAA.

Low cost shot clinics make preventative care affordable

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors advocates for preventive health care for all companion animals. If the cost of veterinary care for your pet is stopping you from seeing a veterinarian, we recommend visiting one of the many affordable clinics in the Lincoln Area. Preventative Pet Care is crucial for the long and healthy life of a pet.

Cotner Pet Care will provide vaccinations and basic services, such as a heartworm test, allergy shots, nail trims and ear cleaning with no exam fees and no appointment necessary. The low cost clinic is available from 6-8 pm on the first Tuesday of each month. For pricing or additional information, call Cotner Pet Care at 402-904-4492.

Low cost vaccination clinics are also offered by Dr. Mark W. Wachal at Petco at 4701 O Street on Saturday afternoons and Petco at 5450 S. 56th Street on Monday evenings. You can find more information about Dr. Wachal at wachalpet.com.

Why should I volunteer?

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors (LAA) is an all-volunteer organization and in the past eight years we have had contact with many great volunteers. Some have stayed with us since our beginning and some whose lives have taken them down a different path, but each one of those volunteers played a big part in where LAA is today. We just couldn't have gotten to where we are today without each and every one of them.

Many ask "Why should I volunteer? What do I get out of it?" Here are just a few things to ponder.

- 1. YOU MAKE A DIFFERENCE in pet's lives, as well as their families lives. As a phone line volunteer, pet food distribution volunteer, fundraising volunteer, I can tell you that I am humbled each and every day when I talk with the families that we help to know that we have made that pet's life better and safer. And I know that if I didn't volunteer, these programs might not be available to the at-risk pets in our community.
- 2. IT'S GOOD FOR YOU. Volunteering provides physical and mental rewards. It reduces stress and makes you healthier. Moods and emotions, like optimism, joy and control over one's fate, strengthen the immune system. Experts report that when you focus on someone other than yourself, it interrupts usual tension-producing patterns.
- 3. YOU LEARN A LOT YOUR PERSONAL GROWTH AND SELF ESTEEM SKYROCKET. I know I have discovered hidden talents that I didn't know I had. Volunteering has helped me to gain professional experience and gain knowledge of local resources to solve community needs. All of those resources help LAA help pets and people in our community.

4. MEET NEW PEOPLE. Not only will you meet other volunteers, but you will connect with people that have diverse backgrounds and learn a lot about your community and the people who live there. I know I get a warm and fuzzy feeling after helping someone calling for our services, or giving them a resource that may be able to help them. As a single volunteer, I help people with one telephone conversation and learn their story.

5. GIVES YOU A SENSE OF PURPOSE.

Volunteering serves to express our sense of purpose. The very nature of volunteering means choosing to work without being paid for it. As a result, people choose to spend their time on issues they feel strongly about. If you are greatly concerned about the treatment and well-being of animals, for example, then volunteering for LAA might be a good fit. If you feel that hands-on animal welfare is over-whelming, LAA's volunteer positions offer you the opportunity to champion those causes without the handson animal experience. And most positions can be done from your home with the availability of a telephone and a computer/ internet connection (training provided) with as little as 2 hours a week.

Deadline extended: September 15

The Mighty and the Tiny

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors' low cost spay/neuter project, The Mighty and The Tiny, is coming to an end. The deadline to obtain a \$25 voucher to have your Pit Bull or Pit Bull blend spayed or neutered has been extended to September 15, 2016. LAA has reached about 85% of our goal and HAS over 40 outstanding vouchers.

To date, through The Mighty and The Tiny project, 165 Pit Bulls and Pit Bull blends; and Chihuahuas and Chihuahua blends have been spayed and neutered. Of the 165 dogs altered, 45 were female Pit Bulls and 42 were female Chihuahuas. When considering the commonly known statistic, one unspayed female dog and her offspring can produce 67,000 puppies in just 6 years, the number of puppies prevented by The Mighty and The Tiny project is overwhelming.

Since the deadline for the \$25 spaying or neutering a Pit Bull has been extended to September 15, 2016, if you are a pet guardian of a Pit Bull/Pit Bull blend or have friends and relatives who have a Pit Bull family member, contact Lincoln Animal Ambassadors through the website, www.




RedRover awards \$2,000 to Lincoln Animal Ambassadors Pet Food Bank



Featured Rescue: K-9 Supply



Our story begins with a rescue. In 2013, my wife and I attended a local dog event in our home town. As we walked around, we were shocked to see a dog showing clear signs of abuse and neglect sitting next to an unconcerned caretaker. After speaking with him and attending to the dog's needs, we refused to leave the event without the dog



That night, we welcomed a tiny, shivering, wet and scared little pup into our home. We were completely unprepared to own a dog - we had no idea what we were doing. We did know, however, that we had made the right

choice in bringing Rudy home. With this very personal introduction into the world of dog rescue, my passion for dog welfare grew and slowly began consuming more and more of my time. I began following

numerous dog rescue pages on Facebook and my eyes were opened to the harsh realities some dogs experience on a daily basis. I quickly decided I needed to help, but I wasn't sure how.

My first thought was to open my own dog rescue. After a lot of research, I realized that there are plenty of dog rescues, and plenty of people already passionate about helping dogs in need. What we could use are new ways for dog lovers to support the rescues they love, in addition to their monthly donations. I began to think of new ways rescue advocates like myself could help rescues help dogs in need. I tried to find something dog lovers already do, and figure out a way to use it to raise money for rescues.

That's when I made the connection: people don't have to give to rescues, but they do have to buy their dog supplies. In that realization, K9 Supply and Rescue was born. An online store that would embrace a multi-billion dollar industry, sell dog supplies to dog welfare advocates, and use all net-profits to help dog rescues help the dogs they set out to save.

Our story continues with you. Let's help rescues spend more time saving dogs, and less time raising money.

Keeping your older dog active

Just because your dog can't run like she used to, doesn't mean it's an all or nothing deal. Don't tell me they don't get a bit depressed sitting around the house! Here are some ways to keep your dog happy and healthy in old age:

- Your dog may not be jogging with you anymore, but they'd probably still like a walk. Just watch your pace and keep it short and sweet. Let them enjoy the sights, sounds and smells of the great outdoors.
- · Your dog may not be chasing balls anymore, but how about a game of tug?
- Did your dog love to play with her doggie friends, but now your dog is in isolation because she's slowed down? Invite some "calm" dogs over to play.
- · How about taking them swimming? It's great exercise, easy on the joints, and perfect for a dog with arthritis.
- Set up mini training sessions, teach them

- tricks they already know, and come up with a few new ones.
- Surprise them with new toys, but give them only one at a time, make them last.
- Try some interactive or puzzle toys hide treats your dog has to find, by moving levers or sliding open little doors. This provides mental stimulation that can reduce cognitive decline, not to mention protecting them from depression and
- Buy your dog a rubber toy and stuff it with some tasty treats. This will keep them busy figuring out how to get it all out!
- A predictable schedule will help reduce anxiety and confusion.
- · Hide healthy treats around the yard, and let your dog figure out how to find them. It will keep her mentally stimulated, and give her some exercise, at her pace.
- Take her travelling or on day trips. Let her see and experience new things.

Give to Lincoln Day

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors (LAA) would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our Give-to-Lincoln day donors for their generous support during Give to Lincoln Day in May, 2016. As a non-profit 501(c)(3) volunteer-driven organization, we rely on donations, private grants and fundraisers like this to continue with our important work in the community. All proceeds from this fundraiser, including our portion of the Lincoln Community Foundation match grant, will go directly toward our low-cost spay and neuter program and our income based pet food bank. We are humbled and encouraged by the amount of community support for our mission and daily efforts to help "at risk" companion animals in this area.

Since its inception six years ago we have altered over 2,400 pets, or an average of 400 procedures a year. Overpopulation is the number one killer of pets in the United States. Annually 2.7 million dogs and cats – about half of those brought into animal

shelters each year – are euthanized. Every 11 seconds in America, one healthy, homeless pet is killed – usually to make room for another unwanted pet with just a 50% chance of being adopted. Our program helps families afford to spay and neuter their pets which directly reduces the number of unwanted pets in our community.

Our income-based pet food bank distributes over 2.5 tons of dry pet food each month, plus canned food, litter and other animal related items. This program helped more than 500 unique families and their pets in 2015. We are committed to ensuring our communities pets are well fed despite economic hardship. Sometimes the ability to feed a person's pet is the one thing that is standing between a person keeping their pet in a loving home and feeling there is no option but to leave them in a cold harsh shelter. Lincoln Animal Ambassadors is addressing the root causes of animal homelessness.

Pet fire safety

"One of the hallmarks of responsible dog ownership is keeping pets safe and planning for unexpected emergencies, including house fires. Pet-proofing the home, developing pet-friendly escape routes, and alerting rescuers of your pets' presence with 'window clings' is the best way to keep your four-legged family member from harm." says Lisa Peterson, AKC spokesperson.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, pets are responsible for 1,000 house fires each year. In light of this statistic, below are some ways to pet-proof your home.

- Cover (or remove) stove knobs
- Keep appliances out of reach of pets
- Protect electrical cords from pets
- Extinguish open flames
- Invest in flameless candles
- Install a barrier in front of other sources of fire

According to the American Kennel Club, 500,000 pets are affected by house fires each year. In light of this statistic, below are some ways to increase the chance that your pet will survive this emergency.

· Affix a pet alert decal to your window

- Keep pets and supplies near entrances when you're out
- Practice escape routes with pets
- Use monitored smoke detectors

If you browse through the responses to a question posted at rileysplace.org about the effectiveness of pet alert window clings, you'll see that everyone had different ideas about how to maximize the chance of pets being rescued from a fire. For example, one poster suggested making neighbors aware of what pets you have, so that they can alert rescuers in the event of a fire. Volunteers with fire departments even weighed in, with one saying that pet alert decals should be made of high quality material to withstand outdoor weather, and that the best location for decals is on the window AND on the electric or gas meter where firefighters go initially to secure the utilities to the building.


After I shared my research with my husband, we had our own discussion about which of the above options were practical and viable for us. I think all pet owners should develop a concrete plan for handling such an emergency.
