Fostering pets:

Providing a loving temporary home

"Me foster?" "I don't know..." "Will my pets do okay with a new animal?" "What if the new animal does not like my pets?" These are questions we all ask ourselves when contemplating fostering an animal. Then there are the many happy stories of "failed fosters" when the foster family falls in love with the animal and keeps it!

In October 2012, I represented Lincoln Animal Ambassadors (LAA) at Lincoln's Project Homeless Connect. Project Homeless Connect is a coalition developed to set up a day when all local organizations providing services for Lincoln's citizens at risk for becoming homeless or are homeless, come together in one space to provide easy access.

During the event, a gentleman, Kevin, came to LAA's table asking if we knew of an available foster home. Kevin needed back surgery and wanted to find a temporary home for his beloved dog, Melanie Elizabeth, a beautiful black lab blend. He stated he would not have surgery until he knew she was being loved and cared for in a good temporary home.

Kevin adopted Melanie at four months of age from a shelter in Vancouver, Washington. She had been abused so it took lots of Kevin's time, patience and devotion before Melanie completely trusted him. Melanie is now a very confident, happy, and smart girl. It turned out that now, because of Kevin's back injury and a series of unfortunate incidents, Kevin was at risk for becoming homeless.

The more I talked to Kevin, the more I knew I could foster Melanie. He described her as loving, happy, able to get along with

any dog and liking kitties. Knowing all this, I made the decision to foster Melanie in my home.

Kevin could not wait many days to have his surgery and because of severe pain, had to be admitted to the hospital several days prior to his scheduled surgery. The next day I picked up Melanie and knew I would love her when about two minutes into the ride home, she tossed a tennis ball into the front seat. My dogs accepted her. My kitties soon learned Melanie would not harm them.

It turned out Melanie is an expert counter-surfer! Her final "epic"

surf at my house was to surf a brand-new, never-opened jar of grape jam off the counter, open it, eat half of it and not spill one drop. Among the other items surfed AND eaten: at least two pears, one avocado, five tomatoes, three loaves of bread, and one-half homemade apple pie. Melanie's surfing at my house has become a legend and provides for very entertaining stories!

Several times Kevin was able to visit Melanie at my house, and what reunions those were. I knew Melanie had not forgotten "Poppa" when I asked her, "Where is Poppa?" and she spent the rest of the evening looking out the front window. I did not ask her that again.

The day came when Kevin called with the good news—he had found an apartment and was ready for Melanie to be back with “Poppa.”

I fed Melanie's excitement to be “going for a ride” by telling her we were going to find Poppa! She bounced around in the back seat, “talking” to the people in cars next to us, whining, and giving me sloppy kisses. High excitement hit when she spotted Kevin waiting outside as we drove up to his new home. True to what Poppa said, Melanie inspected every square inch of her new home, and then focused on Poppa. Kevin sent me a picture later showing Melanie completely stretched out on her new sofa, sound asleep.

I cried tears of humbleness, joy, sadness, and pride—the best adjectives I can think of—on my way home. I consider my experience a triple win!

1. Kevin was able to get his life back on track while,
2. Melanie Elizabeth was in a place where she was loved, and;

3. I benefited with so many wonderful feelings of gratitude and joy caring for such a sweet, precious, silly dog who shared her love with me.

To think that Kevin would entrust me with the care of his most treasured being was very humbling.

The message behind this and one that needs to be brought to the front is that fostering pets is a wonderful, character-growing, positive thing you can do for the pet's good, and selfishly, your own good. Lincoln Animal Ambassadors' mission is to reduce the number of homeless pets in the Lincoln area. Fostering pets is one very important way to keep pets in homes until they can be reunited with their guardians or adopted.

LAA collaborates with Nebraska No Kill Canine Rescue

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors and Nebraska No Kill Canine Rescue collaborated to alter seven dogs all living in the same home on Thursday, May 2!



John owns 2 unaltered male dogs and then his brother-in-law Ryan and girlfriend brought their 5 unaltered dogs (3 males, 2 females) from North Dakota and moved into John’s basement about a month ago. Those five dogs included a male black lab-springer spaniel mix, a female husky and the remaining three puppies from their litter of eight, born nine months ago.

None of the three pups had ever been to a veterinarian.

Ryan recently started a new job and is saving to get his own place, but needed help with his dogs. John wanted to keep

the female puppy and promptly called LAA to request assistance on getting her and his two males altered. Three vouchers were issued and LAA president Mary Douglas reached out to rescue groups to find someone that could help Ryan with his four dogs, including the two they wanted to rehome. Nebraska No Kill Canine Rescue responded and provided transportation to the Spay Omaha Solution Lied Spay/Neuter Center where Ryan’s four dogs were altered, vaccinated and microchipped. Ryan has agreed to surrender his two remaining pups so Nebraska No Kill Canine Rescue is taking one and Taysia Blue Siberian Husky Rescue is taking the other.

That same day, John was busy redeeming his vouchers from LAA to alter his dogs as well. The day’s total for that household = 5 males neutered, 2 females spayed and perhaps numerous lives saved! By making their situation more manageable and providing education throughout the process Ryan and John are getting into the routine of taking better care of their pets with proper food and regular vaccinations so they move toward compliance with city ordinances and help their dogs live long, healthy lives.

This is sure to improve the lives of the people and pets involved. Rumor has it that the cats living in the home (previously altered) are very thankful that they won’t have to endure puppies in the near future!

LAA's Pet Food Bank is changing!

The Lincoln Animal Ambassadors criteria and rules for the pet food bank will change as of July 1, 2013 to a financial need basis. Recipients will continue to be able to receive assistance every 30 days, if they meet the new criteria. Previous recipients will be required to re-apply. Pet food distributions will be made per household and periodic reviews of financial circumstances will be required.

Another important change to the program is that it will now serve only residents of Lancaster County, Nebraska.

For more information and to view the new application and rules go to our website, www.lincolnanimalambassadors.org. Go to the "What we do" menu and click on Pet Food Bank. Applications can be initiated on-line with supporting financial information being mailed or e-mailed for review.



The LAA Pet Food Bank assists the working poor, disabled and down and out. It helps to make the pet food dollar stretch for these families so they don't have to make the painful decision to relinquish their family pet to the shelter or re-home them. Pets provide stability for their families during trying times. Unfortunately, often the pet is the first that is sacrificed in order to be able to afford food to feed the family. It is not only traumatic to the family, but to the pet, when they are re-homed at any age. LAA counsels recipients regarding good pet guardianship and the expenses of having a pet or pets, and discourages obtaining additional pets while using this program. This program is not meant to provide "every meal" for the households pets, but to assist them in feeding their pets. The program can only distribute what has been donated, and special requests are considered, but may not always be fulfilled.

The LAA Pet Food Bank program is solely sustained by monetary donations and grants and food donations by corporate and individual donors. The Lincoln community has risen admirably to the plight of impoverished families who need assistance feeding their pets. For that we THANK YOU!

LAA's spay/neuter program receives two more grants

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors was recently awarded a \$2,000 grant from the Greg Biffle Foundation and a \$5,000 grant from the Petco Foundation in support of our low-cost spay/neuter program.

The Greg Biffle Foundation was founded in 2006 by Greg and Nicole Biffle to



create awareness and serve as advocates to improve the well-being of animals by engaging the power and passion of the motor sports industry. Greg

Biffle is a NASCAR Sprint Cup driver. Since its creation, the Greg Biffle Foundation has awarded grants to over 500 humane groups and animal shelters across the country. Greg teamed up with other NASCAR drivers to help support Spay Day USA, a national campaign of the Humane Society of the United States to promote the life-saving benefits of spay/neuter.

The Petco Foundation has served as a voice for companion animals across the country since 1999.

Today, with more than 8,000 local animal-welfare partners across the country, the foundation donates approximately \$15 million a year to make a difference in the lives of millions of animals. The organization is funded through donations raised during fundraisers conducted in Petco's more than 1,200 stores across the

country, as well as from Petco associates, vendors and corporate contributions. Money raised helps fund animal-welfare organizations, spay and neuter efforts, animal-assisted therapy programs and humane education. The majority of the funds raised remain in the communities where they were raised, and the Petco Foundation is also involved in many national animal-welfare efforts. In 2012, the Petco Foundation surpassed \$100 million in funds raised for companion animals since the organization was created.

Many local pets in need of spaying or neutering will receive assistance thanks to the Greg Biffle Foundation as well as the Petco Foundation. LAA has spayed or neutered 1,066 pets since we began our program in June 2010, which means we are working to decrease the pet overpopulation and subsequently reduce the numbers of pets that enter the shelter system or end up being euthanized. Eight local vets work with LAA to reduce Lincoln's pet overpopulation. We appreciate the support of the Greg Biffle Foundation and the Petco Foundation in this endeavor, as we are an all-volunteer organization and could not provide the services we do without grants such as this.

Remember, two cats and their offspring can produce 420,000 cats in seven years.

Two dogs and their offspring can produce 67,000 dogs in six years. Spaying or neutering just one animal can help save thousands of lives because nationwide, 56% of dogs and 72% of cats entering shelters are killed.

The combination of warm weather and a closed car can literally be a killer for dogs.

Even leaving a dog for “just a minute” to run an errand can lead to tragic consequences. Every year, dogs suffer and die after being left inside cars during the summertime heat. These tragic deaths are entirely preventable.
