# **The Mighty & The Tiny**


LAA is excited to announce their newest project, The Mighty and The Tiny, a spay/ neuter project for two breeds of dogs which are currently at highest risk for ending up in shelters, and often euthanization. The two breeds at highest risk for ending up in shelters are Pit Bulls and Chihuahuas.

Recently, LAA became a member of Best Friends Animal Society's *No More Homeless Pets® Network* which gave them the opportunity to apply for a Best Friends grant. Best Friends believes, "...that collaboration with local pet shelters and animal rescue organizations, the people who know their community the best, is key to ending the killing in America's shelters."

In June 2015, LAA received a grant of \$3,750 to be used toward providing alterations for the "Mighty" dogs of this project, Pit Bulls and Pit Bull blends, allowing LAA to provide spay or neuter procedures for Pit Bulls and Pit Bull blends for just \$25 per dog. Lincoln Animal Ambassadors is including the "Tiny" dogs of this project, Chihuahuas and Chihuahua blends, for the incredible price of \$25 per spay or neuter.

# Are you an animal advocate?

Would you like to be a part of a hands on organization, made up of caring animal advocates like yourself, that actually makes a difference in the lives of animals in Lincoln, Nebraska and the surrounding area?

LAA is looking for skilled and committed volunteers to donate a couple hours a week to do just that. It costs you nothing but your time! Most positions you can do from your own home. Read on for your opportunity to be a part of the solution to Lincoln's pet overpopulation problem. We have openings for the following positions:

#### Pet Food Bank Application Reviewer:

Our program is income need-based and applicants must provide an application and supporting documentation to ensure they meet program guidelines. This volunteer would work from home. A telephone and computer/internet are mandatory. Some clerical/administrative as well as experience with Google Docs is helpful, but we will provide training. This position requires a time commitment of approximately 2-4 hours per week. Must be at least 18 years of age.

Spay/Neuter Phone Interviewer: We are in need of volunteers to conduct spay/ neuter interviews by phone with our program applicants. Interviewers collect necessary information to issue spay/neuter vouchers for our low-cost spay/neuter program. A computer, internet connection, and telephone are mandatory. These hours are flexible—you can choose the amount of time you'd like to volunteer each week. Training is provided.

Vaccination Clinic Volunteer: Lincoln Animal Ambassadors is in need of a volunteer to staff our monthly vaccination clinics. Clinics are held at Cotner Pet Care in the Piedmont Shopping Center the first Tuesday of each month, from 6-8 pm. The volunteer would assist clients in completing registration forms and would clean the exam rooms after each visit. There is some hands-on animal contact possible. This position requires 2 hours per month.

Phone Line Volunteer: We are in need of a phone line volunteer.

This volunteer would be

assigned a phone shift and return calls made to

our hotline during that shift. This position allows the volunteer to work from home. A telephone and computer/internet are mandatory. Experience with Google Docs is a plus, but will train. Time requirement: 1-3 hours per week, depending on shift. Training is provided. Must be at least 18 years of age. Please visit our website, LincolnAnimalAmbassadors.org, for more information about our organization.

Newsletter/Poster Distribution: Lincoln Animal Ambassadors is in need of volunteers to distribute our newsletters and event posters. We have North and South routes available in Lincoln. Volunteer would distribute to specific locations on a route. A vehicle is required. Distributions take place 4-6 times per year. Each distribution requires approximately 2-4 hours.

Donation Pickups We need volunteer to pick up donations from locations around Lincoln. A truck/van/SUV is required. This volunteer will pick up donations and deliver them to our distribution site. The schedule is flexible. Volunteer must be able to load and unload pet food (approximately 50 pounds). This position requires 8-12 hours per month.

Pet Food Bank volunteer: We are in need of a volunteer to help staff our pet food bank on Thursday nights. The volunteer would need to make a consistent weekly commitment from 7-8 pm to help distribute pet food and supplies at our pet food bank. This position requires one hour each week.

# Volunteer Spotlight: **Donna Kavanagh**

### Where did you first learn about Lincoln **Animal Ambassadors?**

I volunteered for a brief time at another organization, then searched online for a local group that I believed to be better suited my philosophy regarding animal advocacy, and found LAA. I've been volunteering with LAA for over 3 years.









#### Tell us a little bit about yourself.

I am a lifelong Nebraska resident, born in Syracuse but have lived in Lincoln since I was 2 years old. I graduated from Lincoln Northeast High School and Southeast Community College. I work full-time at a local insurance company. I have two kids; Laura is a teacher at a daycare and Eric is on active duty in the Air Force. Ron is my life partner and "co-conspirator" on many LAA adventures. I enjoy camping, going to the races, movies, and cooking and baking.

I've never, as an adult, NOT had at least one dog and cat. Usually, I've had several. Pets are a big part of my life. I enjoy their companionship, and the never cease to entertain and amuse me. Each one has its own personality, and I consider them all my "fur kids"!

#### What areas do you primarily volunteer for us at this time?

Currently, I serve on the LAA Board as the volunteer coordinator and as one of the phone line volunteers. In the past, I have been the newsletter coordinator. I also help out at the pet food bank and at various events and fundraisers.

#### What do you find rewarding in your volunteer activities?

Because I don't have a lot of money to give to LAA, I give of my time. I feel very passionate about our programs (pet food bank and spay/neuter program), and I feel that we serve a very important function in our community in trying to reduce the number of unwanted litters, which in turn reduces the number of pets surrendered to shelters. I don't believe there is a valid reason to kill healthy pets because through an effective spay and neuter program, we can impact the numbers of unwanted and homeless companion animals. I find it rewarding to know that a pet is healthier and happier, having been altered, and that LAA has enabled that to be done through our program.

I also find it rewarding to know that we are helping to feed the at-risk pets in our community through our pet food bank. We have local food bank for humans, but there is nothing else like our program for feeding Lincoln's hungry pets. And, in the process of taking care of basic needs, we can educate people about being responsible, knowledgeable pet parents. There is no such thing as a "free kitten" or "free puppy", and people need to understand that pets require time and money as well as love. In everything we do, we try to educate our community about all aspects of pet care. I know that we can-and domake a difference in Lincoln.

### Do you do other volunteer work in Lincoln? No. I do not. I devote my volunteer time

to LAA as that is where I find the greatest

#### What would you recommend to anyone looking to volunteer for Lincoln Animal Ambassadors?

I would recommend that any prospective volunteers take a clue from Nike and "just do it"! We have an easy application process—you can apply online through our website, or through Volunteer Match. We always have several openings available, and there is something for everyone. (We do ask that you be at least 18 years of age for various reasons.) It doesn't matter if you've got an hour a week or 10 hours a week to volunteer--we can put you to work. A lot of our volunteer work can be done from your own home. One advantage to volunteering with LAA is that because we do not rescue, foster, or adopt pets, we can focus on helping people and their pets without the demand for hands-on animal care.

### If you could add one thing to the Lincoln Animal Ambassadors "wish list," what would it be?

Obviously, at the top of my wish list would

be "more money"-money to fund our spay/neuter program. We never have enough funds to help everyone, as our funds are limited to what is donated to us or received through grants. With more money, we could help more people...and the effect of that grows exponentially. The more people we help, the fewer unwanted litters will occur. It's difficult to add just "one thing" to my LAA wish list. Because we are an all-volunteer group, we depend on volunteers to operate. None of us get paid-we are volunteers like everyone else in the organization. Committed, dependable volunteers are always needed. And, it would be very exciting to have name recognition within our community. While we've come a long way in just a few short vears, there are still so many who need to get to know us and what we do!


# Is there anything else you would like to tell

## Featured Rescue: Heartland German Shepherd Rescue (HUGS)

Heartland German Shepherd Rescue (HUGS) is a Nebraska-licensed, all-volunteer, 501(c)(3) non-profit dog rescue organization founded in May 2015. We operate out of the Omaha-Lincoln, Nebraska area. Our main focus is to save German Shepherd dogs at risk of being euthanized in shelters. We also try to help other German Shepherds and Belgian Shepherds in need, as much as we are able to.





Our mission is to rescue, rehabilitate and place the dogs we rescue in permanent, loving homes. We totally rely on our wonderful volunteer

workforce and rescue allies, as well as donations and adoption fees to operate

and to cover rescue costs. We normally have in between 6-11 dogs in foster care at one time. The dogs come mainly from Midwest shelters, some are owner surrenders. As space allows, we also try to save a few dogs from the severely overcrowded, high-kill California shelters, through our wonderful partners, the Miracle GSD Network.

We do not have a shelter facility. The dogs we rescue stay with our volunteer



foster families until the time of their adoption. We provide necessary veterinary care, appropriate nutrition, training and socialization to ready our dogs for their forever home. We support

a balanced training approach. German Shepherd dogs are a highly active, energetic, working breed. They require considerable exercise, socialization, training, leadership and mental stimuli in order to be well-adjusted, well-balanced, and well-mannered dogs. We ask that prospective adopters research the breed and consider the time and financial commitment, before applying to adopt. HUGS adoptable dogs are fully vaccinated, tested for Heartworm disease (started

on Heartworm preventative, or treated if Heartworm positive), spayed or neutered and microchipped.

While we prefer to adopt dogs locally, we may consider other qualified Midwest applicants within an approximate 200 mile radius of the Omaha-Lincoln, NE area, on a case-by-case basis, especially for dogs that may not have a lot of local interest.

In all cases, we must be able to complete a home visit that meets our standards. Applicants must be willing to travel to the Omaha-Lincoln area for an adoption meet and greet with their prospective new HUG dog. All household members, including current dogs, must attend the meet and greet.

Our greatest need is for foster families. Our ability to save a dog's life is most often determined by whether we have an open foster home for that dog to go in. Foster homes need to be in the Omaha, Lincoln, Council Bluffs or surrounding areas. We provide all necessary medical care for our foster dogs, HW preventative, help with food, and provide a great support network. We ask that foster parents bring their foster dogs to vet appointments and HUGS events, or that they make transportation arrangements with us. ### Featured Rescue: The Cat House moves in to new location

Companion animals have a reason to celebrate. The Cat House (TCH) has recently moved to its new location at 3633 "0" Street.

TCH is one of a number of small nonprofit organizations that are dedicated to improving the lives of companion animals in Lincoln.

This cat-focused non-profit, 501(c) (3) organization is managed and staffed by volunteers who do everything from washing litter boxes to interviewing potential adopters, from stuffing catnip sticks (sold as a fundraiser) to mowing the grass. TCH takes cats and kittens into their shelter and volunteers work to find them appropriate, loving, forever homes. All cats are spayed or neutered, vaccinated, tested, and microchipped before adoption.

The search for a new home started with the lease nearing its end at 1935 Q Street. The TCH board knew they were

going to have to make some changes with the rent going up. It was a difficult decision but once made the search was on for a property and a lender that would support the no-kill shelter.

Relying on volunteer efforts as much as possible, the group worked for months gutting the building which once housed offices and a daycare, designing the interior and building walls for the 34 cat rooms as well as support areas to include two kitchens, two laundry facilities and a vet room. The building also has an office, two reception areas and a conference room.

In addition to adoption activities the organization provides education on cat care and various outreach activities such as cat visits to nursing homes and craft activities for children and adults alike.

A Trap, Neuter and Return (TNR) program is also run by TCH and helps provide assistance for humane reduction of feral cat colonies in Lincoln, Live-





trapped cats are spayed or neutered, vaccinated and micro-chipped at participating vet clinics before being released to their original locations. The result is a healthier, non-reproducing feral colony.

## **Give to Lincoln Day**

Lincoln Animal Ambassadors (LAA) would like to take this opportunity to thank all of our Give-to-Lincoln day donors for their generous support during Give to Lincoln Day in May, 2105. As a non-profit 501(c) (3) volunteer-driven organization, we rely on donations, private grants and fundraisers like this to continue with our important work in the community. All proceeds from this fundraiser, including our portion of the Lincoln Community Foundation match grant, will go directly toward our low-cost spay and neuter program and our income based pet food bank. We are humbled and encouraged by the amount of community support for our mission and daily efforts to help "at risk" companion animals in this area.

LAA has the only true low-cost spay and neuter program in Lancaster County and we have altered over 1,800 pets since its inception five years ago, or an average of 360 procedures a year. Overpopulation is the number one killer of pets in the United States. Annually 2.7 million dogs and cats

– about half of those brought into animal shelters each year – are euthanized. Every 11 seconds in America, one healthy, homeless pet is killed – usually to make room for another unwanted pet whose odds of adoption are 50-50 at best. Our program helps families afford to spay and neuter their pets and in turn, reduce the number of unwanted pets in our community.

Our income-based pet food bank distributes over 2.5 ton of dry pet food each month, plus canned food, litter and other animal related items. This program has also helped 489 unique families, and approximately 1,500 unique pets in 2014. In 2015, we estimate we will help approximately 500 unique families and their pets. We are committed to ensuring our communities pets are well fed despite economic hardship. Sometimes the ability to feed a person's pet is the one thing that is standing between a person keeping their pet in a loving home and feeling there is no option but to leave them in a cold harsh shelter.

# Leaving your dog in the car 'for just a minute' may be too long...

Did you know that a dog can experience irreversible brain damage and even death in a hot car in as little as 10 to 15 minutes? And damage can happen hours or even days after the animal is removed from the hot car. Parking in the shade, cracking the windows or leaving them a bowl of water does not help.

According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), leaving windows slightly open does not significantly decrease the rising heat rate. And heat inside a car can rise very quickly! NOAA reported that the temperature inside a vehicle can rise almost 20 degrees in just 10 minutes, rapidly turning your vehicle into a death trap for children or animals left inside. It's called the Greenhouse Effect.

Did you know that dogs can't sweat or handle the heat like humans can? It's no stretch to think of leaving your dog in a parked car as being the same as leaving him in a microwave oven. When a dog is left in a hot car, he is literally cooking from the inside out. In a hot, closed car, your dog's blood can thicken to the point that his heart will be in severe stress, trying to pump the abnormally thick blood through the blood vessels.

# What should you do if you see a dog left in a hot car?

According to Lincoln Animal Control, you should call their office right away. You can also call the Lincoln Police Department, although sometimes those calls are referred to Animal Control. Breaking windows can be a problem, however, if the Animal Control officer believes the animal will not make it, they will do what they need to do. Normally the Animal Control officer will video/audio

tape the event and have Lincoln Police or another Animal Control officer be present at the time.

So remember, when you park the car, don't park the dog too! Play it cool and leave your dog safe at home—not in a hot car!
